


PANDITHARATNE MEDAL

 $\mathbf{P}_{\mathrm{rof}}$ Panditharatne entered the Faculty of Medicine in 1953 from where he qualified with MBBS (Honours) in 1959. After his internship in Surgery and Paediatrics, he joined the department of Anatomy as a Demonstrator in 1960. He soon found his niche as an anatomist par-excellence. In 1962, he sat the primary FRCS examination not with the intention of being a surgeon but of widening his knowledge in the basic sciences and passed the examination at the first attempt. He continued in Anatomy as a Lecturer and proceeded to UK to specialise and do research in Anatomy at Manchester University. There, on his original work on the autonomic pathways in the facial nerve, he was awarded his Doctorate, PhD in anatomy from the Manchester University.

He then did further work on the autonomic ganglia and fibres of the gastrointestinal system before returning to Sri Lanka in 1968. On his return, he was appointed Senior Lecturer in Anatomy and in 1976, he was the automatic choice for Chair of Anatomy of Faculty of Medicine, Colombo. His other academic interests include the clinical orientation course in gross anatomy and revision of the Neuroanatomy course in order to stimulate greater interest among students. He has held several posts in the University hierarchy including Chairmanship of the Curricular and Evaluation Committee of Faculty of Medicine and Acting Dean of Faculty of Medicine.

Dr. Anthonis had an excellent career both in school and as an undergraduate. At Medical School he passed every examination in the first class and carried almost all the prizes that were then awarded;

Then in 1947, he became the first person to return to this country after the 2nd World War, after having cleared the Primary and Final Fellowships Examinations of the Royal College of Surgeons of England at the very first attempts. He served as Consultant Surgeon and then as a Senior Surgeon, General Hospital Colombo, for quarter of a century and it was during this time that his name and fame reached every home in this country.

In 1981 he was appointed the Chairman of the Ceylon Medical Council. In 1981, His Imperial Highness, the Emperor of Japan, conferred on him the highest honour bestowed on a non Japanese 'The Sacred Treasure of Japan'. He was appointed the Post of Chancellor of University of Colombo in the same year. He is the founder President of the College of Surgeons of Sri Lanka. In 1987, the coveted honour of Deshamanya was conferred upon him.

P R ANTHONIS RESEARCH AWARD for the two best publications in peer reviewed journals authored by Sri Lankan surgical trainees in the previous calendar year awarded to **Dr Umesh Jayarajah**- Incidence and Patterns of Liver Cancers in Sri Lanka from 2001 to 2010 & **Dr Oshan Basnayake**-Two squamous cell carcinomas of the skin in a patient with Lynch syndrome.

DR S J STEPHEN GOLD MEDAL

Dr Samuel Jeyarajah Stephen had his primary and secondary education at Central College, Jaffna and obtained his final MBBS from the University of Colombo in 1955. He pursued General Surgery and later trained in Cardiovascular surgery in UK, Germany, India and USA and obtained FRCS and MS.

In 1964, he was appointed the Consultant Thoracic Surgeon, GH Jaffna and later on, in GH Rathnapura. It was here in 1969, with the assistance of Dr. Neil Hamel, he assembled a heart lung machine. He then went on to close ASD's on pump which was the first proper open-heart surgery performed out of Colombo.

He served as the Chief Consultant Cardiothoracic surgeon, General Hospital, Colombo from 1976 to 1994. Following retirement, he served as in the Sri Jayewardenepura General Hospital. He was a trainer and examiner in surgery for the Postgraduate Institute of Medicine and the Chairman, Board of Study in Surgery for many years. He was the President of the College of Surgeons of Sri Lanka from 1988 to 1989. He was the President of SLMA, Sri Lanka Heart Association and Association of Cardiology – SAARC countries along his career.

He was awarded the prestigious title of Hunterian Professor by the Royal College of Surgeons of England in 1988 for the lecture on "Changing patterns of mitral stenosis in childhood and pregnancy". He had published numerous papers in local and international journals on many aspects of cardiac and thoracic surgery. He was honoured with the National Honour "Deshabandu" for meritorious service to the nation by the President of Sri Lanka in 1987.

ORATIONS PROFESSOR R A NAVARATNE ORATION



Rajasinghe Attanavakage Navaratne, MBBS, FRCS, hailed from a family of Ayurvedic physicians. Born to Dr. R. A. Buddhadasa & Mrs. Leelawathie Amarasinghe, he was given a choice of following a career in traditional medicine or taking up an allopathic path by his father; a renowned Ayurvedic practitioner. He chose the latter. Educated at St. Joseph's College, Colombo 10, he entered the Colombo Medical Faculty in 1942. He had an excellent academic record, passing out of Medical Faculty with First Class Honours, placing first in the list of 42 students. He obtained a distinction in Obstetrics & Gynaecology for which he was awarded the Sir Andrew Caldecott Gold Medal for the final MBBS & the Manekhboy Dadhaboy Gold Medal for Midwifery. He worked as Intern House Officer, Surgery in Dr Noel Bartholomeusz's unit.

He was the first Sri Lankan to pass the Primary FRCS examination conducted by The Royal College of Surgeons of England within a year of passing the final MBBS examination & in May 1952, he was successful at the Fellowship of the Royal College of Surgeons of England. During his time in U.K, he trained at The Royal Infirmary, Edinburgh, St. Bartholomeusz's Hospital, London & The Royal Infirmary in Liverpool. Upon his return to Sri Lanka, he worked as a Resident Surgeon at the General Hospital Colombo & volunteered to work in Dr. L. D. C. Austin's surgical ward where he was trained under a great master & perfected the art of general surgery. He became familiar with most of the complex general surgical operations which included prostatectomies, urological procedures for stones, biliary, gastric, colonic, and even emergency orthopaedic and thoracic operations. Dr. L. D. C. Austin in a testimonial stated, "His capacity for taking infinite pains to make anything he applies himself to success is well known".

His next assignment was as Consultant Surgeon, Civil Hospital Jaffna. Dr. P. Sivasubramaniam FRCS, DOMS, LMS(Ceylon), the father of eye surgery in Sri Lanka, recruited him as joint Editor of the Journal of the Jaffna Clinical Society. He wrote profusely in this journal during this time. Amongst his earliest articles were "Prostatectomy - Surgical Progress" & "The treatment of Senile Hypertrophy of the Prostate". He introduced the single stage open operation compared to a two/ three staged procedure in use at that time.

He joined the University on 1st June 1961 as a senior lecturer in Surgery & was appointed Professor & Head of the Department of Surgery in 1965 following the retirement of Professor Milroy Paul. Upon his retirement in 1988, he was conferred with an Emeritus Professorship in Surgery. He was appointed as Secretary of The College of Surgeons from 1980 to 1987 during which time he was also a member of the Advisory Editorial Board of the Ceylon Journal of Surgery. He was conferred with Honorary Fellowship of the College of Surgeons of Sri Lanka in 1987.

Professor Ajith Peiris Malalasekera *MBBS (Col), MS (Col), MRCS (Lond), FCSSL*

Consultant Urological Surgeon, Colombo, Professor in Urology, Department of Anatomy, Genetics and Biomedical Informatics, Faculty of Medicine, University of Colombo.



Professor Ajith Malalasekera graduated from the Colombo Medical faculty in 1996 with Upper Second class Honours and distinctions in physiology and biochemistry. He joined the Department of Anatomy in 1998 as a lecturer and completed his MS (surgery) in 2003. Embarking on further training in the field of urological surgery, he obtained his foreign training in Leicester General Hospital in the UK during 2004-2006. He completed the MRCS (Lond) and was board certified as a specialist in urological surgery in 2006. He was promoted to the position of senior lecturer in 2006. He is an examiner for post graduate examinations at the PGIM and the MRCS(Edin) examination. He is a Fellow of the College of Surgeons of Sri Lanka.

Prof. Malalasekera was the Head of the Depart of Anatomy during 2014-2017. He was also the Coordinator (administrative head) of the Allied Health Sciences Unit of the Faculty of Medicine, University of Colombo from 2007-2014. He has also held the positions of Chairperson of the Nephrourology module, and Senior treasurer of the Medical Faculty Buddhist Association. He is also a resource person for clinical teaching in urology / surgical anatomy for surgery professorial appointment students.

He has been a council member of the College of Surgeons of Sri Lanka since 2010, and currently holds the position of Editor. He is the Editor in Chief of the Sri Lanka Journal of Surgery. He has been a council member of the Sri Lanka Association of Urological Surgeons since 2010, and is currently its treasurer.

He was appointed as a Visiting Urological Surgeon, at the North Colombo Teaching Hospital, during 2008.

Prof. Malalasekera has published on basic sciences and clinical topics and is currently reading for his MPhil in bladder cancer genetics.

ABSTRACT

Clinico-histopathological, survival and molecular genetic study of urothelial bladder cancer in a cohort of Sri Lankan patients

Introduction: Survival data and genetic studies of bladder cancer in Sri Lanka are sparse. The objective was to evaluate clinico-histopathological, survival and mutational profile of bladder cancer in our patients.

Methods: An urothelial bladder cancer cohort was prospectively enrolled from 2013-2017. Clinico-pathological details analysed, and survival calculated using Kaplan–Meier analysis. Meta-analyses of grading of pT1 urothelial cancers and pTa/NMIBC were conducted as per PRISMA guidelines. The first phase molecular genetic study (n=24), sequenced tumour samples based on a 70-gene panel. The second phase involved risk association analyses of 50 single nucleotide variants and aggressive features of bladder tumours.

Results: There were 66 patients with a 7:1 male: female ratio. Histopathologically pTa 24%, pT1

47% and pT2 29%. Of the pT1 tumours 61% were low grade (LG). Majority (71%) of non-muscle invasive bladder cancer (NMIBC) patients underwent transurethral resection only. For the entire cohort the 5-year cancer specific survival (CSS) was 65%. CSS in NMIBC was 75% and 0% in muscle invasive bladder cancer (MIBC). The 5-year female CSS (22%) was significantly lower than in males (71%). In the meta-analysis, the pT1-HG prevalence was significantly higher (p=4.91x10-11) in European, Japanese and Taiwanese studies at 90.1% [95%CI:85.3%-94.0%] compared to the rest of the countries at 56.1% [95%CI:46.5%-65.4%]. The pTa/NMIBC in Europe, China and Taiwan was 66.9%[95%CI:62.4%-71.2%] and 37.6% [95%CI:29.0%-46.6%] in Turkey and other Asian countries indicating a significant difference(P=1.08 x 10-8).

Total mutations in the genes were 10453. Median mutations per patient were 450 (range 22-987). The top 5 mutated genes were *SYNE1, SYNE2, KMT2C, LRP2*, and *ANK2*. The chromatin remodelling pathway accounted for the largest proportion (22%) of mutations. Six variants were linked with aggressiveness of urothelial bladder cancer. The rs1495741, rs1799964, and rs10775480 were linked to aggressiveness (high tumour grade or muscle invasiveness). These results were obtained using the preferred log additive/multiplication genetic model.

Conclusion: Our cohort has a high male to female ratio. The percentage of MIBC was lower than reported in previous Sri Lankan studies. Of the pT1 tumours there is a higher percentage of pT1-LG patients in comparison to Western reports. There is low utilisation of intravesical therapy in the treatment of NMIBC. The 5-year CSS in the Sri Lankan (lower middle-income economy) cohort lies between the values of high-income economies and upper middle-income economies in Asia.

The reasons for poor CSS among Sri Lankan women with bladder cancer needs further investigation. There is a global variation of percentages of pT1-LG versus HG disease in bladder cancer specimens at presentation which could be attributed to delay in treatment with stage migration, ethnic variations in tumour biology, and interobserver variability in assigning tumour grade, and needs further study. There is a high mutation rate in our bladder cancer patients with predominant mutational change C>T and G>A. SYNE1 was the gene with the most mutations. The mutations comprised predominantly of genes of the chromatin remodelling pathway. The allele genotypes of rs1495741and minor rs10775480 were linked with aggressiveness of tumours in our patient samples.

Dr Richard Lionel Spittel (December 9, 1881 – September 3, 1969) was a Ceylonese Burgher physician and author. He was a nature lover; he made many trips to the jungles of Ceylon. Spittel received his education at Royal College, Colombo and the Ceylon Medical College. He joined the government medical service and was sent to England in 1906 to complete his higher education. There he managed to take FRCS in 1909. After returning to Ceylon (Sri Lanka) in 1910, he was appointed as the third surgeon at the General Hospital of Colombo. Furthermore, he moved on to be a senior surgeon and a lecturer at the Ceylon Medical College.

He retired in the year of 1935 and worked as a consultant surgeon. Spittel married Claribel Frances Van Dort a fellow medical student and also the daughter of one of Sri Lanka's successful physicians Dr. William Gregory Van Dort. They raised two beautiful daughters by the name Christine and Yvonne. Spittel passed away on the 3 September 1969, at the age of 87.

Dr Umesh Jayarajah *MBBS (Col), MS (Col),* MD Surgery (Col), MRCS (Glasg), FMAS (India)

Senior Registrar in General Surgery, Special interest in Endocrine Surgery, Postgraduate Institute of Medicine, University of Colombo, Sri Lanka



Dr Umesh Jayarajah completed his undergraduate studies at the Faculty of Medicine, University of Colombo with a First Class Honours at the final MBBS examination in 2015. He pursued his postgraduate studies in Surgery and obtained his MD (Doctor of Medicine) in Surgery in 2021 and obtained MRCS Glasgow in 2022 and FMAS India in 2023. At present, he is continuing his postgraduate training as a Senior Registrar in General Surgery.

Whilst continuing his career as a clinician, he was consistently involved with academic research and he has authored numerous publications in indexed and peer reviewed journals with over 4000 citations and made many research presentations in both local and international scientific fora. He has received many awards and grants including the Presidential Award for Scientific Publication and according to the AD Scientific Index 2021 Rankings for Scientists, he was included in the list of top 2% scientists in the world.

At present, he functions as an Assistant Editor for the Sri Lanka Journal of Surgery and is a member of the academic committee of SLAMADS (Sri Lanka Association of Minimal Access and Digital Surgeons). Dr. Jayarajah's main research interests include cancer epidemiology, general surgery and medical education.

ABSTRACT

Epidemiology and care of surgical cancers in Sri Lanka

Introduction: The burden of malignancies in Sri Lanka is increasing with a doubling of incidence over the last 3 decades associated with a parallel rise in mortality. Therefore, there is a need for reporting of the trends in incidence and planning of surgical cancer care in Sri Lanka. This oration presents the nationwide trends and patterns in the incidence of common surgical cancers supported by data from cohort studies regarding the clinical patterns and outcomes with recommendations for future cancer care in Sri Lanka.

Methods: The trends in the incidence of surgical cancers was calculated using the published data from the Sri Lanka Cancer Registry governed by the National Cancer Control Programme. The surgical cancers presented were grouped into breast, endocrine, oropharyngeal, gastrointestinal, hepatobiliary and urological cancers. The trends in the WHO age standardized incidence rates were quantified and presented utilising the Joinpoint regression analysis. Additionally, data from individual cancers patients with breast, colorectal and bladder cancers were presented to support the recommendations.

Results: A steadily rising trend in the incidence was noted among breast, liver, biliary, oral and renal cancers. Cancers of the colon and rectum, thyroid, and prostate showed a predominant rising trend followed by a plateau in the last few years. Furthermore, a predominant rise in incidence followed by a descending trend was noted among bladder, gastric and pharyngeal cancers. Trends among males and females were similar in breast,



gastric, hepatopancreatobiliary and bladder cancers, whereas in oesophageal, colorectal, renal, oropharyngeal and thyroid cancers showed variable trends.

Analysis of a cohort of breast, colorectal and bladder cancer patients showed that the diagnosis of malignancy was at a more advanced stage. Furthermore, the concordance with the treatment guidelines was suboptimal.

Recommendations and conclusion: A rising incidence of surgical cancer has been observed for most malignancies. These trends are likely due to the combination of better reporting and true increase in incidence. Regardless, with the rising incidence and advanced stage at presentation, more robust community based screening programmes for selected surgical cancers should be considered. Expansion of the coverage of Sri Lanka Cancer Registry is needed in terms of cancer related mortality. With the rise in surgical cancers, more facilities for curative surgical services, radiation oncology and ancillary services are needed. Proper referral pathways to multi disciplinary care at dedicated surgical centres providing specialized cancer care should be implemented. A rising incidence especially among the elderly in an aging population implies an increasing population of incurable cancer patients needing palliative care. A lack of tertiary care and community based palliative care facilities is a major concern in Sri Lanka that should be addressed urgently.



Professor Pramodh Chandrasinghe

MBBS, MD, PhD (Imp. Lon), MRCS, MRCSEd, FRCS, FHEA (UK)

Professor in Surgery & Consultant Surgeon, Department of Surgery, Faculty of Medicine, University of Kelaniya.



Professor Pramodh Chandrasinghe graduated from the University of Kelaniya with a First class honours in 2006 and completed his internship at the Professorial Medical and Surgical units at the National Hospital of Sri Lanka. He entered the surgical training programme of the Postgraduate Institute of Medicine in 2010 and completed the MD surgery in 2014 with gold medals in both clinical and theory components. He took an interest in to clinical research at a very early stage in his career and has published in numerous indexed journals as a trainee.

Prof Chandrasinghe has received several awards for best research from the College of Surgeons including the young researcher of the year and the best research awards. He also won the inaugural 'SAARC young researcher of the year' award in 2011. Pramodh completed his local training at the North Colombo Professorial unit and moved to St Marks Hospital in London for his post MD training



in colorectal surgery. Following the clinical fellowship, he completed his doctoral research to obtain the PhD from Imperial College London in 2019. His doctoral research was on methylation changes in inflammation associated colorectal cancer.

Upon return to Sri Lanka, Pramodh started working as a consultant surgeon at the North Colombo teaching Hospital and a senior lecturer in surgery at the Faculty of Medicine, University of Kelaniya. He was promoted to the post of Professor by merit in 2021.

ABSTRACT

Evidence based quality improvement in colorectal cancer care: marching towards homegrown data

Introduction

Colorectal cancer (CRC) management has evolved remarkably during the past century. Although it is a leading cause of cancer deaths globally, it has promising outcome even at advanced stages. Large body of evidence that exist on CRC is from the west. This analysis will focus on the value of data from Sri Lankan patients and will focus on the value of scientifically sound adoption of treatment pathways for CRC in Sri Lankan patients.

Method

Author's work focusing on survival in CRC in a local population is presented. The data was extracted from the North Colombo CRC database that includes all patients who underwent surgery with curative intent for CRC over a period of time. Survival data was prospectively maintained and evaluated. Value of serum albumin as a survival predictor, tumour regression grade (TRG) in neoadjuvant chemoradiation (NCRT), optimum lymph node harvest based on survival benefit and comparison of survival patterns in this patient population over time was assessed. Kaplan-Meire survival analysis was used for univariable survival analysis while Cox-Proportional hazard, Weibull hazard model, two way interaction terms and stepwise analysis was used for multivariable analysis.

Results

Studying 226 patients with rectal cancer, a serum albumin level above 3.5g/dL was identified as an independent survival predictor for overall (OS: 69% vs 47%) and disease free survival (DFS: 83% vs 69.7%) in the local population (P=0.02).

In a total of 131 patients with mid and low rectal cancers receiving NCRT, a satisfactory TRG (Mandard grade 1,2 & 3) was seen in 78.4%. There was no difference in the 5 year OS (71% vs 65%: P=0.99) or DFS (65% vs 67%; P=0.7) between good and poor responders.

In 131 patients with stage II and III CRC, a lymph node harvest of more than 14 was associated with the maximum survival benefit (P=0.005). It remained an independent survival predictor after correcting for a number of demographic and histological features. The median nodal harvest was less in those receiving NCTR (8 vs11; P=0.01). Those with a poor TRG demonstrated a higher pathological N stage (P=0.01).

Analysing the survival of 845 patients operated pre and post 2010, a significant improvement in 5 year OS (54% vs 69%; P<0.001) and DFS (73% vs 91.7%; P<0.001) was observed in rectal cancers. The colon cancer survival did not demonstrate a change over the time period.

Conclusion

Serum albumin, an easily accessible serum marker in the local setting can be utilised as a survival predictor in rectal cancer. The optimum number of nodal harvest in a cohort of Sri Lankan patients is 14 or more to obtain a survival benefit. Local patient populations with rectal cancer demonstrate a satisfactory TRG following NCRT although there is no survival benefit based on the TRG grade. The improvement in care adopted over time has clearly had an impact on the survival of rectal cancers in this local population. Use of locally collected robust data allows development of parameters applicable to the local population and can improve quality of CRC care.
