

Compassion is a universal human value. Patient care is founded on compassion to help the infirm. Compassion is universal because, firstly we all have experienced compassion in our lives transcending ethnic, national, cultural, religious or gender backgrounds and secondly, it naturally flows from deep within as a human core value.

All major world religions consider 'compassion' as a core tenet of their respective teachings. In Buddhism, karuṇā (compassion) is considered as one of the key four sublime states. In Christianity, numerous biblical references refer to the compassionate God and compassionate people. e.g. "Therefore, as God's chosen people, holy and dearly loved, clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness and patience" - Colossians 3:12; In Islam, the concept of mercy is connected to compassion. It is held that the mercy of God and his compassionate nature envelope people always.

At our surgical meetings, we tend to focus on the management of surgical disease and innovative techniques in general. Although we all are endowed with the core human value of compassion, do we ponder and reflect on how compassionate we are in the real world and at work?

Compassion in patient care settings is nuanced and requires our cognitive empathy at all levels. We all are compassionate towards our patients during different types of encounters. Moreover, compassion

has a broader context; it needs to flow to one's colleagues / peers, all team members and the community at large.

"Compassion is a means of connecting with others — those we love, those to whom we are neutral or indifferent, and those who we find difficult, and establishing warmth. It is a way of transcending boundaries and establishing our shared humanity with a commitment to help." — Michael West in Compassionate Leadership (2021)

Surgeons are team leaders in clinical settings. We hold position in trust for the benefit of patients. Compassionate leadership in patient care settings leads to team satisfaction and better patient outcomes. It is broadly held that compassionate leadership involves attending to, understanding, empathizing with, and helping those we lead. It also requires a clear direction, alignment, and commitment as inclusive leaders.

The Sri Lanka Surgical Congress 2022 (SLSC 22) is themed on Compassionate surgery. While deliberating on all aspects of surgery as like in any other surgical meeting, we thought of focusing on compassion as well this year. There will be many presentations on compassionate surgery, compassionate leadership, and medical humanities during the SLSC 22. 




in venues outside Colombo depicts degree of involvement of the regional chapters of the college.



DR. M.H.DE ZOYSA AWARD

Dr M H De Zoysa was born to a family of five at Madampe, Ambalangoda on November 11, 1930 and had his primary education at Dharmashoka College, Ambalangoda, and his secondary education at Ananda College, Colombo. After graduation from the Faculty of Medicine of the University of Colombo in 1957 with honours, he proceeded to the UK for postgraduate studies and obtained the Fellowship of The Royal College of Surgeons of Edinburgh in 1967.

There was a shortage of surgeons in Sri Lanka then and the hospitals had minimal facilities. Unlike many doctors who left at that period for postgraduate studies he returned to Sri Lanka to serve his motherland. He worked in the General Hospitals of Galle, Ratnapura, Colombo South and the National Hospital of Sri Lanka as a Consultant Surgeon, rendering yeoman service to the citizens of our country.

In the National Hospital, in addition to his surgical work, he contributed immensely to the training of both undergraduates and postgraduates. Even when the Colombo medical school was closed there were a number of medical students who joined his ward rounds and clinics voluntarily. After a distinguished career of 33 years, he retired from the Ministry of Health on November 11, 1990. This opened another chapter in his life.

This was the time when Eelam war 2 had commenced after the failed peace talks with the government of Sri Lanka. There were a large number of military casualties and the forces faced an acute shortage of medical personnel. Realizing the gravity of the situation and the national need of the hour Dr De Zoysa took the courageous decision of serving in the Army. When after retirement, while most professionals wanted to relax, go slow and enjoy life, he took the brave decision of treating the wounded servicemen.

He saved the lives of many brave soldiers at the Palali Military Hospital during major military operations, particularly during 'Balawegaya 1', 'Balawegaya 2', 'Akunupahara' and 'Leap forward'. He had a great love and compassion towards these injured servicemen and all the risks to his life were secondary to this. The College of Surgeons of Sri Lanka, recognizing his services to the nation and the profession, honoured its senior life member Dr De Zoysa, by awarding him an honorary fellowship.

PROFESSOR M.V.P. PEIRIS AWARD

Professor M V P Peiris is one of Sri Lanka's eminent surgeons. A product of St. Joseph's College, Panadura and later St. Joseph's College, Colombo he had a brilliant career both in school and at medical college. He entered Ceylon Medical College having first passed the intermediate examination in science of the London University obtaining Gold Medals in biology and chemistry. He passed out in 1925 with gold medals in Anatomy, Physiology, Tropical Medicine, Medicine, Surgery and Operative Surgery in addition to being awarded the gold medals for best performance in first, second and final professional examinations.

He then proceeded to England and specialized in surgery obtaining MBBS(Lon) and FRCS(Eng) in 1929. He was appointed as a Consultant Surgeon of General Hospital Colombo. In 1952 he accepted the Chair of Surgery at University of Ceylon and continued his teaching commitments with busy hospital schedule and an extensive private practice. In 1960 he entered politics and was appointed to the senate and briefly held portfolio for Health and later for Commerce and Trade. He finally ended his public service career as the Sri Lankan High Commissioner in UK.

DR. P. R. ANTHONIS Research award

Dr Anthonis had an excellent career both in school and as an undergraduate. At Medical School he passed every examination with a first class and carried almost all the prizes that were then awarded; The Loos gold medal for Pathology, Mathew gold medal for Forensic Medicine, Rockwood gold medal for Surgery and Government Diploma Medal.

Then in 1947 he became the first person to return to this country after the 2nd World War, after having cleared the Primary and Final Fellowships Examinations of the Royal College of Surgeons of England at the very first attempts. He served as consultant surgeon and then as a senior surgeon, General Hospital Colombo, for quarter of a century and it was during this time that his name and fame reached every home in this country. He was President of the Association of Medical Specialists for 9 years since its inception and obtained many benefits for the government medical fraternity. In 1981 he was appointed the Chairman of the Ceylon Medical Council.

In 1981 His Imperial Highness, the Emperor of Japan, conferred on him the highest honour bestowed on a non-Japanese 'The Sacred Treasure of Japan'. He was appointed to the post of Chancellor of University of Colombo in the same year. He is the founder President of The College of Surgeons of Sri Lanka. In 1987 the coveted honour of Deshamanya was conferred upon him by his Excellency Mr J R Jayawardene.

DR. S.J. STEPHEN GOLD MEDAL

Dr Samuel Jeyarajah Stephen had his primary and secondary education at Central College, Jaffna and obtained his final MBBS from the University of Colombo in 1955. He pursued general surgery and later trained in cardiovascular surgery in UK, Germany, India and USA and obtained FRCS and MS. In 1964, he was appointed the consultant thoracic surgeon, General Hospital, Jaffna and later on, in General Hospital, Rathnapura. It was here, in 1969 with the assistance of Dr Neil Hamel, he assembled a heart lung machine. He then went on to close ASD's on pump which was the first proper open-heart surgery performed out of Colombo. He served as the Chief Consultant Cardiothoracic surgeon, General Hospital, Colombo from 1976 to 1994. Following retirement, he served at Sri Jayewardenepura General Hospital. He was a trainer and examiner in surgery for the Postgraduate Institute of Medicine and the chairman, board of study in surgery for many years. He was the President of The College of Surgeons of Sri Lanka from 1988 to 1989. He was the President of Sri Lanka Medical Association, Sri Lanka Heart Association and Association of Cardiology - SAARC countries along his career

He was awarded the prestigious title of Hunterian Professor by the Royal College of Surgeons of England in 1988 for the lecture on "Changing patterns of mitral stenosis in childhood and pregnancy". He had published numerous papers in local and international journals on many aspects of cardiac and thoracic surgery. He was honored with the national honour "Deshabandu" for meritorious service to the nation by the President of Sri Lanka in 1987.



ORATIONS SIR A M DE SILVA Memorial Oration



Sir Arthur de Silva, KCMG, CBE,
FRCS was admitted to the Fellowship at his first attempt at the age of
25. A keen student of the science of
medicine, he became a masterly practitioner in the art of general practitioner in the
West End of London and later as a junior physician
at the General Hospital, Colombo. A was a well-travelled
man, and garnered a rich harvest of knowledge from the
surgical clinics of Europe and America.

His ability as an otorhinolaryngologist was recognized by foreign colleagues of world renown. His services were sought by patients from Africa to Australia.

Minimal incisions, bleeding, and handling of tissues, neatness, rapidity, and dexterity characterized his work. He rarely spoke in the theatre, and what little he said was never a rebuke or reprimand. His placidity and good temper never deserted him even when faced with aggravating provocation. Never did he expose a patient to danger for the sake of adding to his dramatic surgical triumphs, but he did not shrink from taking legitimate risks to safeguard life.

Sir A M de Silva might have made a significant contribution to surgical literature from his experience of half a century, but modesty discouraged him from writing of his own opinions or work. His contribution to the alleviation of suffering among the poor and needy was his life's work, a contribution made, not only through his own labours in the General Hospital of Colombo, but also by training his pupils in the way he had trained himself. His students learned from him not only surgery but also human kindness. As an examiner he was reputed to be strict, but he preferred to asses a candidate's knowledge rather than

probe the depths of his ignorance.

In his retirement speech, he pleaded SIR A M DE SILVA for a greater spirit of professional fellowship, and enjoined tact, patience and understanding towards patients as fellow beings faced with disease or death. His words are worth recalling to our minds decades after he spoke them.

He has delivered 5 orations and 3 memorial lectures. He also has 16 international and 25 national journal publications and has been the recipient of 16 international and 12 national and local awards.

Professor Fernando is the co-author of the book 'The technique of Thyroidectomy and its evolution' and has contributed to chapters in a few international and national books. He is also a member of the editorial boards of the World Journal of Endocrine Surgery, the Ceylon Medical Journal and the Journal of Surgery: Open Access.

ABSTRACT

"TRIALS, TRIBULATIONS" AND THE EMERGENCE OF TOTAL THYROIDECTOMY - A SRI LANKAN PERSPECTIVE

Thyroidectomy as has an unenviable historical backdrop. Banned in 1850 in France, It was resurrected by the efforts of many. The outstanding contributions were made by the "magnificent Seven" of thyroid surgery. In 1919 William Halstead annunciated that "extirpation of the thyroid gland typifies, better than any operation, the supreme triumph of the surgeon's art".

The technique of thyroidectomy has evolved a great deal over the last 100 years, due to better understanding of thyroid diseases and improvements in the other fields of medicine. The dissection of the gland, preservation of the function of parathyroids and maintaining integrity of the RLN and the EBSLN are dealt with meticulously now.

Total thyroidectomy is associated with complications of bleeding, permanent injury to RLN & EBSLN and permanent hypoparathyroidism. Many centres have reported incidence of complications around 1-3%. This is the bench mark for surgeons' world over. In the studies conducted in the author's unit very similar results have been achieved. This may be considered a bench mark from a Sri Lankan perspective.

Voice change is a major concern after thyroidectomy. In a study done in the author's unit, it has been has shown that RLN recovery much faster than the recovery of the EBSLN. A fact not much highlighted in the Literature. The recovery will take up to 3 months in most patients. In studies done on the surgical practices in Sri Lanka regarding thyroid surgery it has been shown that the practice has changed over the last decade. More total thyroidectomies are undertaken. Younger surgeons are undertaking more total

thyroidectomies and the surgeons in Sri Lanka are beginning conform to the accepted global standards.

Incidental carcinoma has a significant incidence especially in endemic regions of the world. The quoted incidence is around 10-20%. In two studies done in the unit, the incidence estimated has been between 8, 8% and 11.38%. Surgeons must be cognizant of this in decision making when surgery is undertaken for benign disease of the thyroid.

Recurrence of Goitre is a 'throwback' from the past as subtotal thyroidectomy was the standard operation for more than 100 years. Most common cause of recurrences is the enlargement of embryological remnants of the thyroid and a modern thyroid surgeon must excise the embryological remnants meticulously.

Surgery for recurrent goitre is a difficult task. Likelihood of complications is higher. Lateral approach to the thyroid makes the task much easier and our experience has shown it be safe and effective. It is recommended, and may be considered another bench mark from a Sri Lankan perspective.

Cosmetic issues and cost must also be considered in thyroidectomy. Thyroid disease is much more prevalent in females and the cosmetic issue becomes important especially in younger females. Mini incision open thyroidectomy is practiced in the unit. Data confirms that Mini incision open thyroidectomy is a safe cost effective alternative to endoscopic thyroidectomy especially from a Sri Lankan perspective.

The obituary of open total thyroidectomy shall not be written for a long time.

DR NOEL **BARTHOLOMEUSZ**

He was the son of Mr. Hugh Hamilton Bartholomeusz and Mrs. Alice Maud Janz. His father was an advocate of the supreme court. He was educated at Royal college, Colombo.

Born on the 25th of Deceme-

ber,1910 during the last stages of

community, descendants of Dutch, the

former rulers of Ceylon before British.

Dr Noel Bartholomeusz obtained LMS (Ceylon) in 1935 from Colombo Medical College, topping the batch. Two eminent surgeons, Dr R L Spittel and Dr L D C Austin were in the same batch.

He married his theatre nurse Nora Beven in 1936. After qualifying, he served at Nuwara Eliya, Badulla and Avissawella District Hospitals.

Soon after the World War II, he went to UK on a government scholarship for postgraduate training. Within two years, he passed final FRCS and returned to the Island in 1949. On return he was appointed a surgeon at the General Hospital, Colombo.

He was considered as a perfectionist in the real sense of the word and was a meticulous surgeon, greatly respected by all for his expertise, dedication, and commitment to patient care. He taught his trainees and colleagues by example and not by teaching. His colleagues and trainees have described him as a very nice man, very easy to get on with, with a very high standard of ethics.

He was very particular about his appearance. A handsome

young man always wearing only white satin drill suits and white buckskin shoes and white socks, and a coloured tie matching his white shirt with an orchid in his left buttonhole, he was an unmistakable figure in the hospital that had only few surgeons then.

When he visits every morning sharp at 7 am for the ward round, he had a different colour orchid flower in his buttonhole which his wife places there each morning and, at the end of the ward round in the female ward, he used to present this orchid to a patient.

He worked round the clock both at the hospital and in the private practice. He retired prematurely in 1969. Unfortunately, his life was shortened by his failing kidneys and was on a dialysis machine at home every night under the moral support of his wife Nora who nursed him with loving care throughout this difficult period. This did not deter him from his lifelong wish to serve his patients till the end, working up to 3 days prior to his peaceful death on the 27th of November, 1977.

Dr Bartholomeusz had a very happy personal life. Noel and Nora were an affectionate couple for over 40 years in their lovely home. They were an extremely generous couple. His long-standing friend and his anesthetist Dr B S Perera had said that he was not at all surprised when he was informed that the magnificent property they lived has been gifted to the College of Surgeons of Sri Lanka.

We owe them a debt of gratitude for their foresight and generosity. They will be remembered for generations to come. May their souls rest in peace.

MBBS, MS Consultant General Surgeon Army Hospital, Narahenpita Adjunct Associate Professor Uniform Service University of Health Sciences, USA Being a commissioned officer in Colonel rank in the capacity of a Consultant General Surgeon for nine years in the Sri Lanka army medical corps, currently affiliated to a 1000 bed tertiary care Army Hospital Colombo, Colonel Ratnayake has amassed a wealth of clinical experiences related to combat related injuries. He has developed expertise in combat related extremity vascular trauma in the 2008-2009 period by handling war related 129 vascular injuries and authored a book chapter in Rich's vascular trauma 3rd edition 4th edition. He has 40 publications in high impact peer reviewed journals in the mentioned field. Colonel Ratnayake has delivered two keynote speeches in Walter Reed Military Medical Academy, Maryland, and Kirov Military Medical Academy in St Petersburg on the same topic as a subject matter expert. His deployment to South Sudan level 11 hospital in 2017, provided an opportunity to cater to multinational UN forces in Sub Saharan Africa. Colonel Ratnayake is also an adjunct associate professor at Uniformed Services University of the

Health Sciences, Bethesda, Maryland.

His current research interests are on limiting ischemic threshold in extremity vascular trauma, study on compounding factors in limb salvage following combat vascular injury and constructing management algorithms for selecting limbs for amputation vs reconstruction, study on extremity ballistic wound profiles and constructing upgraded balloon tamponade of hemostasis. Further, current research focuses on trauma systems development in Sri Lanka and Asia and military civilian system integration framework creation.

Colonel Ratnayake is a member of multiple national and international professional societies including International Association for Trauma surgery and Acute Care (IASTIC), Ambroise Pare International Military Surgery Forum (APIMSF), Asian Collaboration for Trauma, Sri Lanka College of Surgeons (CSSL), Sri Lanka College of Military Medicine and current ACT chair for committee for research and co-chair for emergency medical services in CSSL Trauma committee.

A PRELIMINARY EXAMINATION OF GLOBAL MILITARY AND CIVILIAN TRAUMA SYSTEM INTEGRATION

INTRODUCTION- COVID 19 pandemic exposed global health system vulnerabilities in both poorer and richer nations. WHO list of Global Health Threats for next decade includes climate change, conflict crisis and road traffic accident fatalities further highlighting health equity as a major concern. There are predicted greater complexities in facing these challenges in current global connectivity. Meanwhile there are exemplary exchanges between military and civilian health system assets during the past decade especially in disaster care, humanitarian field and more recently during COVID pandemic Institutionalizing those favorable

ABSTRACT

lessons learned and mitigating gaps identified should be scoped to address the complex health system challenges. With this intention we are intended to perform preliminary investigation on exemplary country profiles on context, facilitators, barriers and challenges in civilian military exchanges to inform future research endeavors.

METHOD- Convenient sampling identified 8 country profiles with context for civilian military exchanges. Qualitative research through Brown and Clarke thematic analysis followed the compilation of responses to open-ended questionnaires circulated via e mails (to identify context, facilitators, barriers, and lessons learned.)

RESULT- Eight total case studies were

completed, five addressing specific and three addressing countries international partnerships. Themes which emerged as drivers for integration included history of conflict, unique geography, and skill maintenance for military physicians. High level government support was a central theme for successful integration, and financial issues were often seen as the greatest

CONCLUSIONS-Through contextual backgrounds for civilian military health exchanges there are common emerging themes of drivers (skill sustainment, trauma care), facilitators (high level government support, academic integration subspecialty care), and barriers (financial, cultural, security).

Dr. Amal Priyantha is a Consultant Gastrointestinal Surgeon at the Colombo South Teaching Hospital, Kalubowila.

He was educated at Mahinda College, Galle and obtained his MBBS from the Faculty of Medicine, University of Ruhuna in 1986. Having completed his internship, he entered the Postgraduate surgical training programme and obtained his MS (Surgery) in 1993. He did his further training in gastrointestinal surgery at Westmead Hospital, Australia in 1996/1997. On completion of training he obtained his FRCS(Edinburgh).

Dr Amal Priyantha has undergone advance training in gastroenterology at Kyoto Prefectural hospital, Japan and training in early detection of Gastrointestinal cancers at Keio University, Tokyo, Japan.

He has been the past president of the Digestive disease and Endoscopic society of Sri Lanka and is a council member in the Asia Pacific Society for Digestive Endoscopy (APSDE) and Asia Pacific Association of Gastroenterology (APAGE). He is also a member of the American Society for Gastrointestinal Endoscopy.

Dr Amal Priyantha has help the post of Chairman of the Board of Study in Gastrointestinal Surgery in the Post graduate Institute of Medicine, Sri Lanka and is an examiner for the MD Surgery part II examinations.

He has delivered 2 orations and over 50 presentations and has been an invited speaker at the annual academic sessions of The College of Surgeons of Sri Lanka, Oncology, Radiology, Pathology and ENT societies in Sri Lanka and many international conferences in India and Japan. He has conducted several laparoscopic and endoscopic live demonstration workshops in Colombo and Kandy.

ABSTRACT

LAPAROSCOPIC SURGERY FOR COLORECTAL CANCER; NEED FOR A BENCHMARK

Introduction: Laparoscopic colorectal surgery has become the standard procedure for treating colorectal cancer worldwide today. Since there ae differences in treatment offered to patients with colorectal cancer (CRC) among medical institutions in Sri Lanka, establishing a benchmark could lead to

- (1) Improvement of treatment of colorectal cancer in Sri Lanka;
- (2) Improvement of the results of treatment;
- (3 Increase benefits for patients

Aim: To assess the results of laparoscopic surgery for CRC in our centre and to compare with the published results in an attempt to establish a bench mark.

Methods: Data were collected from personally kept patients records as well as from records analyzed and compared with published data. The Kaplan-Meier method was used to calculate the survival data and survival analysis was performed after excluding patients whom died within 30 days after surgery and their differences were

compared by the log rank (Mentle Cox) test. In estimating disease-free survival, the patients who died without having disease recurrence were censored at the time of death. In addition, quality of life in patients who underwent anterior resection (AR) was studied in a small cohort of patients.

Results: Laparoscopic resection was carried out in 116 patients with CRC between May 2013 and 2022. The mean age was 61.7 years (26 to 82) and there was 67 males and 49 females. Conversion rate was 3.5%; hospital stay was 5.7 days; twenty-five patients (21.5%) developed post-operative complications, commonest being wound infection (9.4%) followed by paralytic ileus (4.3%); anastomotic leak was 1.7%; 30-days mortality was 0.8%. The mean follow-up was 24.7 moths and disease specific survival was 80.38% and disease free survival was 72.71%. Distal and circumferential margins were negative in 98% and 93% respectively. The mean lymph node harvest was 10.7. In patients who underwent AR, Low Anterior Resection Syndrome (LARS) was present in 62.5% of patients.

Discussion: Laparoscopic penetration rate is regarded as an important indicator of a nations healthcare system. We performed 74.3% of CRC resections laparoscopically. Studies from other parts of the world show that laparoscopic penetration rates for CRC continued to increase annually and researched 78.5% in 2018. Among the other key parameters, our conversion rates, mean hospital stay, 30-day mortality, anastomotic leaks are better than most of the published data. Though our operating time and blood loss are higher, it has not affected the overall results. Survival data are discussed in keeping with is the shorter follow-up period which is one of the drawbacks of this study. We also have achieved a high standard in other key oncological parameters such as distal and circumferential resection margins and lymph node harvesting. However sub-group analysis reveals that the lymph node harvest for rectal cancer needs to be improved.

Conclusion: We have analyzed almost all the parameters related to laparoscopic resection of the colorectal cancer in our patients and found to be optimal except in few of them.


